# Home Learning Project How does Jack's beanstalk grow?

This is a summary of some of the ideas for home learning in term 5. Please see the project grid for more detailed ideas and further website links.

#### Maths

Follow the links for daily maths short inputs and activities.

Our maths units for this term are:

<u>Year 1</u> - Number: multiplication and division. This is all about understanding what more than one group of a number or object would look like. We also count in 2's 5's and 10's.

**Fractions**: Recognise, find and name a half as one of two equal parts of an object, shape or quantity and then for a quarter. We do <u>not</u> need to use the  $\frac{1}{2}$  or  $\frac{1}{4}$  numbers yet.

We will then move on to **Geometry** which is position and direction firstly looking at turns about a point and then making position comparisons such as above, to the left of, to the right of and next to. https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/year-1/

<u>Year 2</u> - Geometry: position and direction. This is about describing position, direction and movement including movement in a straight line and distinguishing between rotation as a turn and in terms of right angles for quarter, half and three-quarter turns (clockwise and anti-clockwise). We also order and arrange objects in patterns and sequences.

**Problem solving and efficient methods** The white rose link has a variety different problems. Explore the most efficient way to solve each one. These problems apply many of the skills we have mastered in KS1.

**Telling the Time** Tell and write the time to five minutes, including quarter past/to the hour and draw the hands on a clock face to show these times. Know the number of minutes in an hour and the number of hours in a day. Compare and sequence intervals of time.
